



Important Information on your Riding Tour



General Information

- No selfie sticks – horses can be scared of sticks
- No screaming – horses are very sensitive to noise
- Approaching a horse: calmly from the side



Step by step

1. Sign the “confirmation of own liability” and pay for your tour
2. Make sure that all your pockets are closed so that your mobile won't fall out
3. We help you to find a helmet, gloves & rain gear (if needed)
4. Introduction to horseback riding (see below) & information on the tour
5. We will ask you about your level of experience and show you your horse
Please wait close to your horse. We will help you to get on. Please don't try to get on the horse by yourself because the **saddle** can move
6. Please try to remember your horse's name
We know it can be hard ;) They all have a nametag on the **bridle**
7. When you are on the horse, we will adjust your **stirrups**
8. When everyone is on the horse, you will get the **reins**. Until then, your horse is attached to the fence.

During the ride

Please don't try to stop or turn around by yourself. If something is not alright, tell the guides.

1-Hour-Tour & River-Crossing-Special:

We start by walking and then try to split the group later on. (Splitting is usually possible if there are more than 3 riders participating). You can then decide if you want to continue to ride walk or if you want to go faster (tölt, trot no gallop). Going faster should be for those who have ridden before because it can be bouncy ;) We always try to adjust the speed to our participants experience and wishes, but is also depends on the group size and ability of each participant.

2-Hour-Tour:

This tour is for riders who are quite experienced only. Here we ride walk, trot, tölt and with very experienced riders also gallop.

You want a photo taken? No problem, we are happy to take pictures of you after the ride.

How to ride a horse

To start with, our horses are trained “English”. If you have learned that, it is basically the same. If you are used to “Western”, it is quite different. Before you get on the horse we will do a thorough introduction in which we will go through the following questions:

- * How to get on?
- * Where can I hold on to?
- * How to hold the reins?
- * How do I communicate with my horse?
- * How to get off?
